


THE SATS TESTS

- The end of KS2 assessments are sometimes informally referred to as 'SATs'.
- SATs stands for Statutory
 Assessment Tests and they are held at the end of Key Stage Two.
- It is a statutory requirement for year 6 pupils in state primary schools across the country to do the SATs.
- Tests are created by the Standards and Testing Agency.



THE SATS TESTS



The SATs papers consist of:


- -English Reading
- -English Paper 1: Grammar, Punctuation & Spelling
- -English Paper 2: Spelling
- -Mathematics: Paper 1 Arithmetic, Paper 2 Reasoning, Paper 3 Reasoning

Writing is assessed using evidence collected throughout year 6. There is no year 6 SATs writing test.

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
SATs tests are marked externally; the school receives the results July.

The marked tests will provide the following information:

- -A raw score
- -A scaled score
- -An indication of whether the national standard has been met.


GRADING OF THE TESTS

- A child awarded a scaled score between 100-109 is judged to have the 'national standard' (ARE/EXS) in the area judged by the test.
- If a child's score is 110 or above, they are working above the expected national standard (GDS).
- If a child's score is between 80-99, they are judged to have not yet met the national standard and performed below the expectation for their age (working towards).



SPELLING, PUNCTUATION AND GRAMMAR PAPER 1

The children will have been working hard with their class teacher on developing and securing the knowledge of the technical vocabulary needed in this test.

- Fractions, decimals and percentages


MATHEMATICS PAPER 1: ARITHMETIC








MATHEMATICS PAPER 2: REASONING





A cinema sells tickets at three different prices.









SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Children with additional needs (who have similar support as part of day-to-day learning in school) may be allotted specific arrangements including:

- Additional time
- Tests being opened early to be modified
- An adult to scribe for them
- An adult to read for them
- The use of prompts or rest breaks
- Arrangements for children who are ill or injured at the time of the tests
- Pupils with an EHCP are automatically allowed up to 25% additional time (except for the spelling paper, which is not timed). Pupils who use the modified large print or braille versions of the tests are automatically allowed up to 100% additional time.




We ask that children do not complete past papers. We use these for mocks and need accurate scores and question analysis of how they are performing to inform our planning and teaching.

MATHS



- Play times tables games
- Play mental maths games including counting in different amounts, forwards and backwards
- Encourage opportunities for telling the time
- Encourage opportunities for counting coins and money; finding amounts for calculating change when shopping
- Read longer number e.g. house prices
- Look for examples of 2D and 3D shapes around the home
- Identify, weigh or measure quantities and amounts e.g. when cooking
- Play games involving numbers or logic, such as dominoes, card games, monopoly

Encourage a love of reading



Enjoy stories together



Read a little at a time but often



Talk about the story before, during and afterwards- discuss the plot, characters, their feelings and actions, how it makes you feel, predict what will happen and form opinions.



Look up definitions of unknown words



All reading is valuable. Reading can include: fiction, non-fiction, poetry, newspapers, magazines, football programmes and TV guides





Visit a library



WRITING




- Practise and learn weekly spellings- make it fun!

- Remember that good readers become good writers!





- Praise and encourage them










THE WEEK ITSELF







THINGS TO REMEMBER
